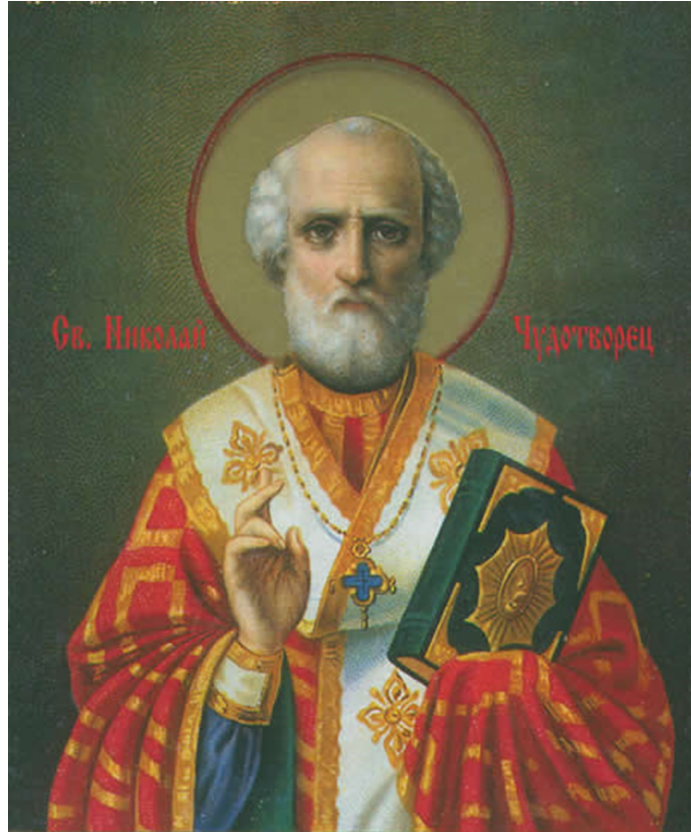


First Sunday of Advent, November 30

Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, December 8

Holy Day of Obligation

Today is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is the Patronal Feast Day of the United States of America.

“Mary, a virgin not only undefiled but a virgin whom grace has made inviolate, free of every stain of sin.” – St. Ambrose (388)

Text: CCC # 491 “Through the centuries the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, "full of grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of her conception. That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Pope Pius IX proclaimed in 1854: The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin.”





Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, December 12

"Hear me and understand well, my little son, that nothing should frighten or grieve you. Let not your heart be disturbed. Do not fear that sickness, nor any other sickness or anguish. Am I not here, who am your Mother? Are you not under my protection? Am I not your health? Are you not happily within my fold? What else do you wish? Do not grieve nor be disturbed by anything." Memorial of Saint Lucy, December 13

St. Lucy was a third century Christian martyr. Born of nobility, Lucy consecrated herself to the Lord at a very young age. Her mother, however, upon the death of her husband arranged for a marriage for Lucy. Lucy implored the intercession of St. Agatha, another consecrated Virgin, who was tortured and killed at the hands of her suitor. Lucy, too, suffered torture at the hand of her suitor, after she refused him marriage. Her eyes were put out and she was finally killed by being stabbed in the neck. Upon her burial, her eyes were miraculously restored to her body. St. Lucy, patron saint of the eyes and eye ailments, pray for us!

3rd Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday, December 14

4th Sunday of Advent, December 21

Holy Day of Obligation

Feast of Saint Stephen, the First Martyr, December 26



“But he [Stephen], filled with the Holy Spirit, looked up intently to heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God, and he said, ‘Behold, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God.’ ...They threw him out of the city and began to stone him...As they were stoning Stephen, he called out, ‘Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.’”

Feast of Saint John, Apostle & Evangelist, December 27



St. John the Evangelist, one of the 12 apostles, and one of the 4 Gospel writers, writer of three New Testament letters, and the author of the Book of Revelation. was the only Apostle not to be martyred. His Gospel, more than an account of the events in the life of Christ, was written with the inclusion of Divinely inspired theological reflection, afforded by the time he spent on earth in the presence of the Blessed Mother whom Christ entrusted to him from the Cross. His feast, celebrated during the Christmas octave, directs our eyes from the cradle of the Word made Flesh to the altar of the Wedding Feast of the Lamb and the glory opened for us by the Incarnation of Christ..

**Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph,
December 28**



“And [Jesus] went down with [Mary and Joseph] and came to Nazareth and was obedient to them; and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature and in favor with God and man.” Luke 2: 51-52

“A man and a woman united in marriage, together with their children, form a family. This institution is prior to any recognition by public authority, which has an obligation to recognize it. It should be considered the normal reference point by which the different forms of family relationship are to be evaluated. “(CCC, #2202)

Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, January 1, 2026

Holy Day of Obligation



“Mary is truly ‘Mother of God’ since she is the mother of the eternal Son of God made man, who is God himself.” (CCC #509) Mary’s divine maternity is a truth that has always been held in the Church and which was dogmatically defined in 431 at the Council of Ephesus. Nestorius, Archbishop of Constantinople was spreading the heresy that Jesus was not one Divine Person with 2 natures, human and divine, but rather 2 persons, human and divine, and that Mary only bore the “human” Jesus. The Council of Ephesus declared this heresy, and decreed that Mary is indeed Theotokos, or “God-bearer,” and that she bore one divine person, Jesus Christ with 2 natures, human and divine.

Memorial of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton, January 4, 2026

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1871) is the first American born saint. She was canonized in 1975 by Pope Paul VI. After being married to William Seton for about 10 years and bearing 5 children, he contracted tuberculosis. The family traveled to Italy to facilitate his recovery, but William succumbed to the disease and died shortly thereafter. While in Italy, Elizabeth, an Episcopalian, became intrigued by the Catholic Faith, especially with the Eucharist. And after bringing her family back to America, she was received into the Catholic Church. She whole-heartedly embraced the will of God no matter where it led her, and she was particularly devoted to the Blessed Mother, having lost her mother as young child. In Emmitsburg, Maryland, she founded the first American religious community for women, the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph’s; she began the first free Catholic school; and she established the first American Catholic Orphanage. She was particularly devoted to abandonment to the will of God and possessed a great love for the Blessed Sacrament.
